This kind of program allowed each student to experience the process of writing and publishing a book. Writing skills are one of the basic skills when it comes to communication and self-expression and learning how to write isn't just about developing writing skills. It's also a way of training the mind to think and a way to express ourselves. This initiative also supported students to think creatively, imaginatively, and express themselves by taking ownership of their own learning.

In the Young Authors Exhibition Project, students had the opportunity to focus on active writing skills over a period of 4 weeks, which contributed to their overall communication skills to compose a story. The students went through all the writing process (Prewriting- First Draft- Revising- Editing- Publishing-Sharing) then they shared their work with their teachers and peers during that day.



For us, as a school, we saw the need to become better writers, and we've integrated writing across the curriculum. Children work hard to develop the process of writing throughout the year. We wanted to have this day as a celebration to honor the student writers.

This event wasn't just rewarding for the students. Seeing the progress, the children made was rewarding for the faculty as well. Students felt so accomplished. It was a rewarding experience for our young writers.






Elders of the future



Boom, I landed on my hand hard


I woke up to realize I was okay.

Why should we wear our school uniform?



The main theme of "Still I Rise" by Angelou is respect for oneself and assurance. In the poem, Angelou describes how her self-esteem allows her to conquer any obstacle. She demonstrates how nothing can depress her. Nothing, not even her skin colour, can stop her from rising to any occasion.

Even though slavery had long since been abolished, Angelou observed its impact on both society and African Americans. This poem is her statement that, for one, she will not let societal hatred decide her level of accomplishment.


This poem serves as both an appeal to people to live above the society in which they were raised and a declaration of the author's own will to climb beyond it. Figurative language is used extensively in this moving poetry. It serves as a kind of secular anthem to the downtrodden and oppressed. The victim will rise up no matter the brutality, no matter the scenario, or the manner used.


"Funeral Blues" by W.H. Auden explores several significant issues. Death, loneliness, and grieving are a few of these. The speaker addresses what it's like to grieve the loss of a loved one and how it isolates one from the rest of the world, which connects all three of these issues inside the poem. The speaker commands everyone to be silent in the opening words and for everyone to "come to grieve." While looking for a change in the world, the speaker is unsuccessful. Nobody recognizes how alone they are in their loss in a sufficient way. There is a recurring theme of reducing noise and encouraging stillness to keep the dog from barking. In fact, that appears to be the main idea of the opening verse. Today, silence is the rule. The concept of muzzling a drum to silence a piano is intriguing. The drum mentioned here, in my opinion, is not a real drum. As the stanza's following line alludes to the coffin's arrival, it is actually a picture of pole bearers' footsteps. The author was more than capable of conveying their feelings in a unique manner while also including a subtle message.

In contrast to "Funeral Blue", which conveys a sad energy through the writer's style of writing and illustrates the loneliness he has experienced, "Still I rise" focuses on confession and self-improvement and teaches the reader how to endure their darkest moments, and that demonstrates the various purposes of these poems. I really like reading "Still I Rise" because it gave me a positive sensation that made me want to keep reading it, unlike Funeral Blues.


